SOP Template: Isolation Room Cleaning Protocols for Infectious Patients

This SOP details **isolation room cleaning protocols for infectious patients**, including the step-by-step cleaning and disinfection procedures, appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) usage, waste disposal methods, handling of contaminated materials, ventilation requirements, and post-cleaning inspection standards. The objective is to minimize the risk of cross-contamination, ensure a safe environment for healthcare workers and patients, and maintain strict infection control within healthcare settings.

1. Scope and Purpose

This Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) outlines the protocols for cleaning and disinfecting isolation rooms housing infectious patients, to prevent cross-contamination and maintain compliance with infection control standards.

2. Responsibilities

- Environmental Services staff: Conduct cleaning and disinfection.
- Unit Nurse-in-Charge: Oversee cleaning processes; ensure room readiness post-cleaning.
- Infection Control Officer: Monitor protocol compliance.

3. Required Equipment and Materials

Item	Specification	
Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)	Gloves, gowns, N95 mask or equivalent respirator, eye/face protection, shoe covers	
Cleaning Supplies	Hospital-grade disinfectant, cleaning cloths, mop & bucket, disposable wipes	
Waste Disposal	Biohazard waste bags, sharps containers	
Other	Signage, hand hygiene supplies	

4. Procedure

1. Preparation

- o Inform relevant staff and ensure the isolation room is vacant or patient consent/education is given.
- Perform hand hygiene before donning PPE.
- Don complete PPE per protocol.
- Place appropriate signage at the room entry.

2. Waste Management

- Remove all waste in designated biohazard bags.
- $\circ\;$ Sharps must be disposed of in approved sharps containers.

3. Cleaning and Disinfection

- o Clean all high-touch surfaces first (doorknobs, bed rails, switches, etc.).
- Disinfect all surfaces using an approved hospital-grade disinfectant.
- Change cloths/mops between rooms or when visibly soiled.
- Clean floors, moving from clean to dirty areas, using a double-bucket system when feasible.

4. Handling of Contaminated Materials

- Linen: Handle with minimum agitation. Place directly into designated laundry bags for infectious materials
- Reusable equipment: Clean and disinfect before removing from the room.

5. Ventilation Requirements

- Ensure negative pressure or appropriate airflow is maintained throughout cleaning.
- o Do not disrupt air handling systems or close ventilation grilles.

6. Post-Cleaning

- Remove and dispose of PPE as per protocol, performing hand hygiene after each removal step.
- · Enter inspection checklist completion and notify supervisor/unit staff that cleaning is finished.

5. Inspection and Quality Assurance

- Supervisor or Nurse-in-Charge to inspect cleaned areas using a standard checklist.
- All deficiencies must be corrected prior to room re-occupancy.
- Document cleaning date, time, and staff involved.
