Standard Operating Procedure (SOP): Infection Prevention and Isolation Techniques

Objective:

To minimize the risk of infectious disease transmission within healthcare settings by implementing standardized infection prevention and isolation practices.

1. Scope

This SOP applies to all healthcare workers, support staff, patients, and visitors within the healthcare facility.

2. Responsibilities

- · Healthcare Workers: Adhere to all infection prevention and isolation protocols as outlined.
- Supervisors/Managers: Ensure compliance and provide necessary PPE and supplies.
- Housekeeping Staff: Follow environmental cleaning and disinfection procedures.
- Visitors: Comply with all restriction guidelines and hand hygiene protocols.

3. Procedure

3.1 Hand Hygiene Protocol

- Perform hand hygiene before and after patient contact, before aseptic procedures, after exposure to body fluids, and after contact with patient surroundings.
- Use alcohol-based hand rubs or wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Ensure availability of hand hygiene supplies at all points of care.

3.2 Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- Select appropriate PPE based on mode of transmission (e.g., gloves, gown, mask, eye protection).
- Don PPE before entering patient rooms; doff PPE before exiting and perform hand hygiene.
- Dispose of single-use PPE in designated waste containers.

3.3 Environmental Cleaning and Disinfection

- Clean and disinfect high-touch surfaces (bed rails, doorknobs, light switches) frequently and after patient discharge.
- Use EPA-registered disinfectants according to manufacturer instructions.
- Ensure cleaning staff wear appropriate PPE during procedures.

3.4 Patient Isolation Procedures

- Place patients with suspected or confirmed infectious diseases in single rooms when available; cohort as necessary.
- Post clear isolation signage at room entrance indicating required precautions.
- Limit patient transport; if necessary, ensure patient wears a mask and follows hand hygiene.

3.5 Visitor Restrictions

- Restrict visitors for isolated patients unless essential (e.g., caregiver for pediatric patients).
- Screen visitors for symptoms and ensure compliance with PPE and hand hygiene protocols.
- Document visitor entry and exit as required by facility policy.

3.6 Waste Management

- · Segregate infectious waste in labelled, leak-proof containers.
- Follow facility policies for transport and disposal of regulated medical waste.
- Ensure staff use appropriate PPE when handling waste.

4. Documentation

- Maintain records of isolation procedures initiated and PPE usage.
- Log cleaning and disinfection schedules for each patient room and unit.

5. Training

- Provide regular training and competency assessments for staff on infection prevention and isolation procedures.
- Update training materials as per latest evidence-based guidelines.
