Standard Operating Procedure (SOP): Isolation Precautions for Infectious Patients

This SOP details the **isolation precautions for infectious patients**, including the identification and classification of infectious agents, implementation of contact, droplet, and airborne precautions, proper use of personal protective equipment (PPE), patient room assignments, environmental cleaning protocols, visitor restrictions, and staff training. The goal is to prevent the transmission of infections within healthcare settings by ensuring strict adherence to isolation procedures and maintaining patient and staff safety.

1. Purpose

To outline procedures that minimize the risk of infection transmission from infectious patients by implementing appropriate isolation precautions in healthcare settings.

4.2 Isolation Precautions

| Droplet | Influenza, pertussis, meningitis, etc. | Surgical mask, gloves, gown, eye protection as required | Single room preferred; spatial separation (≥1 meter) if cohorting. |
| Airborne | Tuberculosis, measles, varicella, COVID-19 (aerosolizing procedures), etc. | N95 respirator, gloves, gown, eye protection as required | Negative pressure room required. |

4.3 Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- Don PPE prior to room entry; remove PPE and practice hand hygiene before exiting.
- Dispose of single-use PPE appropriately; clean and disinfect reusable PPE.

4.4 Patient Room Assignment

- Isolate in a single patient room when available.
- For airborne precautions, use negative pressure rooms and keep doors closed.
- If necessary, cohort patients with the same infection.

4.5 Environmental Cleaning

• Enhance cleaning of high-touch surfaces in isolation rooms.

- Disinfect equipment after each use per facility protocol.
- Follow proper procedure for waste and linen disposal.

4.6 Visitor Restrictions

- · Restrict visitor access according to precaution type.
- Instruct allowed visitors on PPE use and hand hygiene.

4.7 Staff Training and Compliance

- All healthcare staff must complete training on isolation precautions annually.
- · Monitor and audit compliance regularly; provide feedback and corrective action as necessary.
